Module aims

The purpose of the module is to build upon Latin Language and Literature (or A Level) and to allow students to deepen their understanding of Latin by further reading of significant works by authors and in genres for the most part not previously studied. As well as developing students' ability to read Latin more fluently and to translate from Latin, the module also teaches advanced grammar, and provides an introduction to literary criticism and philological analysis at degree level.

Outline syllabus

This is an indicative module outline only to give an indication of the sort of topics that may be covered. Actual sessions held may differ.

- Set Text 1: Virgil Aeneid 12
- Set Text 2: Sallust, Bellum Catilinae
- Set Text 3: Cicero, Catilinarians 1

Set texts are subject to change year on year.

Recommended dictionaries: Charles Lewis and Charles Short, *A Latin Dictionary* (Oxford, various reprints) or C.T. Lewis, *An Elementary Latin Dictionary*, Oxford 2002.
